LOOKING FORWARD TO AKT

This is the time of year to be looking ahead to the planning of our 4-Day weekends and ensuring our leaders have been well prepared. As part of that preparation, the Advance Kairos Training (AKT) schedule can be found on myKairos.org and there is a Denver site open for applicants to download the information and print off the registration form.

Here are the details for AKT Denver, Colorado:

DATE: May 12-14, 2017

TYPE: Kairos Inside

LOCATION: Training at Burns United Methodist Church, 1095 Newark Street, Aurora, Colorado, 80010.

AIRPORT: Denver International Airport (DEN), Colorado

ARRIVAL SPECIFICS: Plan flight to arrive between 1pm & 3pm.

HOTEL: Doubletree by Hilton, Denver- Stapleton North, 4040 Quebec St., Denver 80216. Check-in will be available starting at 2:00pm on Friday. The hotel has free shuttle service to and from the airport.

Distance from the airport to the hotel: 17 miles, 25 minutes travel time.

Distance from the hotel to the training site: 11 miles, 14 minutes.

OTHER LODGING: (reservations made by Denver Kairos Team)

PROGRAM INFO: The AKT will be held at the Burns United Methodist Church. Our Denver team will provide transportation from the hotel to the church and back.

Check-in starts at 5:30 pm Mountain Time. Dinner is served at 6:00pm. Training will begin at 7:00pm.

COST: Cost for double room with 2 participants = \$210. Cost for Single Room = \$285. Fee includes: 2 nights lodging, Friday evening meal, 3 meals on Saturday and breakfast on Sunday. Program concludes Sunday at noon.

COMMUTER (no need for lodging): \$85.

NEW FACILITY START-UPS

The vast majority of Kairos volunteers have joined a Kairos Team that has been operating for some time. Even if their first Kairos weekend is a #1, they have little idea of what goes into starting a new Kairos program in a new facility.

Kairos of Colorado is in an expansion phase. This started back in 2014. At the time, Kairos Prison Ministry International (KPMI) was operating in five prisons in Colorado. It was known that State Prison officials would like for KPMI to start up programs in a number of other facilities. Since May of 2014, three new Kairos programs have been started in Colorado. Bent County was the first and held its #1 weekend in the fall of 2015. Buena Vista also held their #1 weekend at the end of September. Then in October of 2016, the Women's prison in La Vista held their first weekend.

So how did this all come about? Did 30 or so Kairos volunteers get together and say, "Let's do a Kairos weekend at La Vista in the fall of 2016"? Did the same thing happen at Bent County and Buena Vista? You can bet your life savings that it did not happen that way.

The driving force behind the La Vista start-up were three ladies with a desire to bring Christ to the ladies incarcerated at La Vista. These three ladies are, Ann Weida, Jean Magnuson, and Jean Yanchek. They started their work on bringing a #1 weekend to La Vista in the late spring of 2015. These ladies attended a volunteer appreciation dinner at the prison. The Warden made an announcement that Kairos would be coming to La Vista in the future. So our three ladies went to work to make this happen. Nineteen months later, Ann Weida led the first Kairos weekend at La Vista. They did not over reach and hosted 24 participants on the first weekend. Ann and the two Jeans were able to recruit an additional 22 recruits for the initial weekend. La Vista has a working Advisory Council and are starting Prayer and Share and monthly reunions as well. Nineteen months is a long time to work on a project. It takes stamina and lots of faith in our Lord. Thank you ladies for having a vision and the willingness and faith to carry it out.

Bent County, the first Colorado start-up in several years, was also an eighteen month process. Our first trip to Las Animas was in May 2014. Kevin Condon and myself made the 3-hour drive to meet with the Bent County prison officials. We were met in Las Animas by Russ and Karla Gorrell, who had expressed an interest in starting Kairos at Bent County. We were invited by the prison chaplain, David Hestand, to come down. He set up the meetings with the prison officials.

The Gorrells came aboard and we started our journey to bring Kairos to Bent County. Seventeen months later we held our #1 weekend. We had seven full tables of 42 participants, 15 stewards, and 34 team members. Bent County operated during the start-up period with an ad hoc Advisory Council. After the first weekend a new Advisory Council was elected. Bent County has completed three weekends now and Kairos has grown significantly within the facility. Recent reports of having 90+ inmates for monthly reunions and having 60+ in attendance for weekly Prayer and Share is a testament of what God does when we are obedient to his call.

The Buena Vista start-up came about in response to a request from the Deputy Superintendent of Colorado Department of Corrections. Again, Kevin Condon and myself made our initial contact with the Buena Vista prison officials in May of 2015. It was late January and early February 2016 before the train began to move forward at Buena Vista. We met with a man (Roger Hilbig) that had ties to the area and had served on several Kairos teams in Texas. Similar to the ladies experience at La Vista, Roger Hilbig found himself with a desire to get involved with Kairos again through attending a volunteer and guest reception at Buena Vista when their renovated Chapel was dedicated. At our first organizational meeting, Roger brought a number of other men with him that were interested in getting Kairos into Buena Vista. Their work came to fruition the first weekend in October when Buena Vista #1 was held at that facility. There were seven tables with 42 participants and 11 stewards. There were 34 inside team members and another 7 outside team members for a total of 41 team members. Buena Vista has been having weekly Prayer and Share meetings since last April. They have continued the weekly Prayer and Share meetings since the weekend. They already have a date set for their first 2-Day Retreat in January. They have a new Advisory Council in place that will start in January.

What does the future hold for new start-ups? Right now, we do not have any new start-ups on the horizon, but that can change tomorrow. When God opens the door and shows the way, we will be ready for #4. Want to be a part of helping start a new Kairos in a new facility? It is hard work and takes commitment beyond doing a weekend. God never calls his people to sit on their hands and do nothing, He always calls us to action. Kairos of Colorado has an opportunity to start another six to seven Kairos programs in the prisons in the state of Colorado.

SERVANT LEADER'S REPORT

This past October was the 25th anniversary of Kairos at Delta Correctional Center. What a blessing it was to see the very first servant leader at Delta Correctional Center (DCC), Andrew Kaminski, present for the weekend! His years of service in Kairos and his other ministries are commendable. As Servant Leader, I was impressed with the participation of all our Kairos team of men, including our resident members, our wonderful kitchen angels, and the support of the church community, who once again gave of themselves completely to share the love of Christ. I was blessed to serve as Servant Leader for this Kairos and also blessed to serve as a former inside leader during 2004 at DCC. I could not have done it without the support of my team, who held up my arms when I grew weary and loved me even when I became impatient with them.

I want to take a moment to talk about my experience as Servant Leader, not to draw attention to myself, but to give all the honor to our Lord Jesus Christ. I was an inmate at Delta Correctional Center from 2003 to 2006. I attended Delta Kairos #23, then served on other Kairos weekends as a member of the team of Kairos graduates. Some of the same brothers on the Outside Team of Kairos #23, served with me on this Kairos. What a blessing! Many tears of joy were shed with my band of brothers. God has taken me a long way since my release in 2006. I graduated Bible College with a degree in Ministry in 2015. Isn't it amazing how God brought me back to the beginning? I remember driving into the facility as Servant Leader the first day with all the emotions flooding my soul and a bit nervous about being the leader of such a wonderful group of Christian men. I can't imagine what my life would have been like without the love of Christ they shared with me during my first Kairos and then during all the team formation meetings. I never forgot our motto: "Listen, listen, love, love." Those four words have stayed with me all these years. It was my time to give back to the candidates what was given to me many years ago - "Agape love".

Many of the candidates were uneasy and uncomfortable on the first night of Kairos #50, but as we know, things begin to change on Friday and then by Saturday most of the residents begin to blend with their table families. The effect of the Agape letters was amazing and many of the residents began to break at receiving grace into their hearts. Some of the other men still held out, but even the walls of Jericho came tumbling down when God showed up.

Saturday night the hard work of forgiveness was evident with the presence of the Holy Spirit doing His work. It was time to let go of pain, heartache, unforgiveness, and hate. The men began to understand the ramifications of the Cross and the love that was shed for them through the forgiveness of their sins. They began to realize that you must forgive in order to be healed from unforgiveness. Finally, Sunday arrived and all of us on the Team knew what was in store for the candidates. There is always a sense of sadness, too, that comes with the closing, because we have all grown close to each other. However, the purpose of Kairos is to bring the love of Jesus Christ to the prison through the continuing ministry of Kairos through the Inside team members, who will start fulfilling their calling. I never forgot when I came down the stairs singing "Surely The Presence of the Lord is in This Place" for my Kairos in 2003 and now as I led the graduates back into the community room, I could not hold back the tears that filled my eyes then and now. I could not speak. I cannot describe with any accuracy what it meant to me. Love filled the room. When I turned to look at the men as they joined their families on the platform, I saw what we all hold dear to our hearts - the evidence of the love of Jesus through Kairos. I saw 40 men who were changed in some way by that love. Even though there were still a few hard hearts, seeds had been planted into their lives and many joined us as new members of the body of Christ.

Many expressed their feelings during the open microphone part of the graduation ceremony. Some talked about the cookies and food. However, what I heard the most was that they thought they were unlovable, but upon seeing the support of the church community from outside the walls, they were forever changed. I did not tell the participants until the last day at the graduation ceremonies that I was a former inmate in the same prison they are in and that I had completed my Kairos there as well. My heart broke in a good way as some of the men expressed hope at knowing that since I had made it, they could too. No words could describe that moment and I give all the glory to Jesus Christ. Tears, hope, unconditional love, new friends, and forgiveness were all found and can never be replaced. Delta Kairos #50 was a great success and, as a former inmate, I know that God is in the ministry of Kairos. I am thankful that I was called to be the Servant Leader for Delta Kairos #50 because I grew during the whole experience.

The staff were so open and wanted us to have a great weekend — and that we did! When we first met the Warden, she said she wanted Kairos in LaVista before she retired and that she, the Associate Warden, Kirk Machin of the Department of Corrections' Faith and Citizen Programs, the Program Manager, the officers in charge and even the Volunteer Coordinator could not have been any more helpful and encouraging. Two of the officers commented what we do is wonderful with one saying he has been thinking about looking for a Church and now is convinced he will be doing that. God is good!!!!

Our closing went well and I do not think it could have been any better in any way. I have been involved with Kairos for 20 years now and, by far, this weekend was the best I have experienced.

For our Instructional we had 23 participants show instead of 24, because the 24th had a visit from her children. That is understandable. We are now in the process of getting the Prayer and Share groups going and are working out the different little stumbles we need to overcome.

We had 8 new volunteers and 4 volunteers from the DWCF that stepped up to assist us so we had a full team all full of love and wisdom. As I said, it was evident God was definitely in charge and with us.

We on the team and each of the participants would like to say thank you to all for your prayers and encouragement.

Am I excited about LaVista? You bet!!!!

RIFLE #23 — 29 Sept-2 October

Rifle #23 was a blessed weekend, even with the pall of it being the last Kairos weekend at Rifle Correctional Center. Twenty-four men completed the weekend and offered a variety of answers to the closing questions. The family comments were the normal responses. Some of the individual comments are included here:

- I am lucky to be in prison now. I let go of so much anger yesterday. I had mixed a lot of religions together and I was confused and bitter.
- It has taken 40 years for me to do what I should have done a long time ago. Now I am blessed to be part of a royal family.
- I was kind of on the fence. I didn't want to act like thug but I thought I needed to just to survive. But, now I have found that I can just be myself with the Kairos community, I don't need the tough persona.
- This weekend has opened my eyes to a lot of possibilities that are much different and much better than the way I was living.
- I had built up a wall against Christianity. I was homeless and living on the streets. There were Christians who helped me and told me about Jesus. I wondered who is this Jesus guy. But I saw the fruit of spirit in these people and that is what drew me to the church.
- I was involved in drugs using and selling. I drug a lot of people down with me, and I felt a lot of guilt and anger. I am really inspired by these brothers.
- I only came because my celly kept telling me I should go to Kairos. I got this funny feeling that something was happening inside and I didn't like it. It was like a little spark at first, but now it is a flame and I need to keep it going.
- I came from a Christian family and there was no reason for me to stray. But I went from DUI to burglary to murder. I haven't been a lovable person, but these people have loved me without even knowing me. God has been pulling me and I have been able to fellowship with other believers. I believe God will use me for a greater purpose.

BUENA VISTA #1 — 29 Sept-2 October

I served on the Buena Vista Correctional Facility (BVCF) Kairos #1 team under unusual circumstances. In my case, I was sick. Not badly and I had nothing that was contagious, but I was weak and unable to walk well. However, I enjoyed the whole experience enormously... and you will, too. I'm much better now and have agreed to serve on the new Advisory Council. BVCF is the most beautiful facility in the CDOC system. I'm looking to serving on the next weekend there, if they'll have me.

We did what some of us know as a "Texas style" weekend at BVCF Kairos #1. We used the new silver manual and followed the Riverbanks closely, but the facility and the enormous number of "newby" volunteers posed challenges. Since Kairos had never been done at BV, we had to buy new chairs, new eating tables, and new round tables. Start-ups can be expensive. We did seven tables, though. We also had solid clergy and volunteer attendance from community churches with a few imports from other Colorado facilities, of course. BVCF draws from the mountain communities. We drew this team from all over.

Kairos volunteering is enormous fun and as inspiring and transformative for the volunteers as it is for the inmates. We were able to get servants from population who had attended Kairos at Sterling, Bent County, Territorial, and even some out-of-state prisons. The inmate servants did an awesome job. The church in BVCF is very strongly improved by the enormous effects of a #1.

Don't wonder if being a Kairos volunteer will be too taxing, too tiring, too expensive, or too challenging for you. If you are called, just get off your butt and come. Our incarcerated brothers want to meet you and cherish the time you have together as a "visit from the fathers," as one inmate put it. Feel the love and experience the flow of the Holy Spirit. Kick it up a notch. There's nothing like serving the Lord...and you know it. Applying is as easy as pie. Just go to <http://www.kairoscolorado.org/> and then to "Get Involved."

KAIROS PRISON MINISTRY INTERNATIONAL

[Kairos Prison Ministry](#) is a lay-led Christian ministry which conducts a highly structured program designed for use in male and female correctional institutions. The Kairos program starts with a weekend event which allows participants to receive Christ's love through the servitude of Christian Kairos volunteers. During this event participants are given the opportunity to experience a spiritual renewal, accepting God's call to a life of Christian witness and service to one another during their stay in the institution, and beyond. Participants are encouraged to establish small, two-to-five-person "Fourth Day" Prayer and Share groups within the institution. The groups meet regularly to share their lives on a deep spiritual level and to pray for one another, other residents, and staff in the institution.

Kairos is currently in thirty-five states and nine other countries — Canada, United Kingdom, Australia, South Africa, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Honduras, Nicaragua, and Peru. The course materials are available in English and Spanish. The international ministry now includes some 30,000 volunteers.
