BENT COUNTY #1 IS ALMOST HERE!

It is going to happen! Those of us that have been working on Bent County #1 (Oct. 1–4, 2015) for the past 16 months have never doubted that Kairos would come to Bent County. The Bent County Warden, Assistant Warden, Chief of Security, Programs Director, and Prison Chaplain are all in support of Kairos. They have supported us from day one. They have made it easy for us as they possibly could.

We have completed our first two team meetings. These are so important. We have 17 new volunteers that have never participated in a Kairos before. Thirteen of these newbies are on the Inside Team and four on the Outside Team (Support). Our team meetings focus on the basics of the Kairos weekend. By the time this is published, Bent County will be days away from the start of our weekend on Oct. 1st. We will have completed 4 all day team formation meetings. We will have previewed the major talks and covered the Kairos Riverbanks from shore to shore. Each team meeting had a theme that we do a devotion for and then had table discussions on questions about that week's theme. We watched a video each meeting that highlighted that week's theme. By the time people are reading this, our team will have discussed and practiced the different types of prayer circles that are done during the weekend. We will have discussed and set up how the hand washing ceremony and the forgiveness ceremonies are to be done. Best of all, we will have discussed and instructed each Inside team member how to carry out cookie distribution to the entire facility population.

Our Bent County team will consist of 37 volunteers that have a servants' heart. Twenty-eight of these volunteers will make up the Inside team and nine will make up the outside team. We have three local churches that are in support of our weekend. United Methodist Church of Rocky Ford has volunteered their facility for all 4 team meetings. United Methodist Church in La Junta will prepare a meal for the entire team on the first Thursday night. United Methodist Church of Las Animas has made their fellowship hall available to us as a staging and meeting place. Our team will meet there each morning and evening. The Outside Team will be housed there during the day. We have been blessed to have so much community support for our weekend. A fourth church, Plum Creek Community Church in Castle Rock, is paying for the purchase of over 22,000 cookies

Bent County #1 will have 42 participants in attendance. The weekend will be held in the auxiliary gym at the facility. We will divide the gym into 3 areas separated by large plastic tarps. We have fashioned a support system made of concrete in 5 gallon buckets with PVC pipe used as frames for the tarps. One section will be our conference room, consisting of 7 tables and the leadership table. Another section will be the Chapel with 7 rows of nine chairs set up for the table families. Then, our third area will be the dining/kitchen area. We will have 7 tables set up for the table families, a table for the volunteers not at a table family, and a table for guests such as the Warden, Chaplain, etc. Local vendors have contracted to provide the hot food for our weekend. These entrees along with sides will be brought into the prison for each meal by our runner/driver. Our menus will include Bar-B-Que, hamburgers, a Mexican dinner, fried chicken tenders, pizza, and Po'boy sandwiches. We will provide a continental breakfast spread each morning before we start. On Thursday afternoon, we will have a nice spread with sandwiches, fresh fruit, jalapeno poppers, cookies, and veggie trays. For drinks, we will serve lemonade, tea, coffee, and water.

Our team has members from 3 states. We will have 4 team members on the Inside team from Texas and another from Idaho; they are all seasoned Kairos volunteers. The Outside team will have 2 members from Texas as well.

BENT COUNTY #1 IS ALMOST HERE! (cont'd.)

We have been blessed to have veteran Kairos volunteers from other facilities on Colorado stepping up and helping us out. We will have volunteers from both Sterling and Territorial helping us on #1.

This will be my second Number 1 Kairos to do. There is something about a Number 1 that is different from all others. I think it is the expectation of not only the volunteers, but also the brothers inside. The whole facility will have expectations for this weekend. It is exciting to do the first ever Kairos at a facility, I'm excited, the team is excited, the participants are excited, and the facility management is excited. I'm sure that the most important person of all to be excited as well is Our Redeemer Jesus Christ.

STERLING 2-DAY RETREAT

Our 2-day on the "high side" of Sterling Correctional was unique and unscripted. It was August 8 - 9, 2015. Due to current restrictions on the high side, we are only allowed in one hour in the morning and one hour in the afternoon. There was a mix up with the prison on which side of the prison (East or West) we were scheduled to have our 2-Day. After discussions with the volunteer coordinator we decided to have it on the 'West' or "high side," which is way more restricted and controlled.

Our team decided to have the regular inmate speaker do his scheduled reunion since he had so much time invested as well as the fact he was prepared and looking forward to the subject. He had picked "perseverance through difficulties" as a topic. We had a great teaching and wonderful talks in our small groups. We broke up into four groups with two volunteers and eight inmates per group.

In the afternoon, Kairos volunteers were split up, because we have the "East" reunion on a Saturday afternoon. So, only Mike Carey and myself went back to meet with the guys on the west side in the afternoon. Because of time restrictions and circumstances, we opted for open mike with the over 40 men who came back. We heard some powerful testimonies and great encouragement from the men who shared.

Mike Carey was the chapel speaker on the following day (Sunday morning) for their Chapel service, which had more than 100 in attendance. He spoke on the topic of "Who Do You Say That I Am" and our need to recognize Christ as our God in all respects and not as just a great religious leader. Our 2-Day was concluded with Chapel because of Sunday afternoon not being open to us. It was unconventional but we were flexible with the circumstances we were given. We know it didn't take Jesus by surprise. God is good and we were all encouraged and satisfied with the results.

DELTA TWO-DAY RETREAT

This retreat (held July 18 - 19, 2015) was attended by 24 Outside Team members (of 32 currently active men), 26 Kairos graduates from the Inside, plus 47 "guests" - those who have not yet attended a Kairos 4-Day Weekend. We have traditionally made the two-day retreats and monthly reunions open to any offender at Delta Correctional Center (DCC) who wishes to know more about the Kairos experience. Many of those "guests" attending Kairos events have turned out to be some of the more active contributing graduates after making their 4-Day Weekend.

As is our custom in Delta Kairos, the upcoming Servant Leader is chosen to lead the 2-Day Retreat. Last July, it was Brad Kolman, a recently retired Delta County Attorney, who put together an outstanding program and led a very successful two-day event. The theme he chose was "A LIFE OF LOVE", consisting of eight talks over the two days. The talks were:

The Greatest Commandment - Love the Lord
The 2nd Greatest Commandment - Love Others
God Is Love
Love Is Patient and Kind
Love Does Not Envy or Boast
Love Is Not Selfish or Proud
Love Is Not Easily Angered
The Greatest of These Is Love

Obviously, the fourth through eighth talks were based upon 1 Corinthians 13. The new Chaplain at DCC, Tim Bergstrom, delivered the third talk (God Is Love) as part of his regular Saturday afternoon worship service, which is open to all inmates in DCC. We yielded the Chapel of Hope to Chaplain Bergstrom for one hour so that he can conduct his regular weekly worship service, and then continue with Kairos after the service.

We observed very good participation by the men in all six of the "small" prayer and share groups, as they discussed questions posed by the speakers after each talk. A highlight of the 2-Day Retreat is always the Q&A panel on Sunday afternoon, where anonymous questions concerning "what you always wanted to know about spirituality but were afraid to ask" are fielded by a panel of experienced clergy and lay members of the Outside Team. We were particularly pleased with how well the panel dealt with a number of good questions offered by the offenders present.

The Delta Kairos Advisory Council held a productive meeting during the long lunch break on Saturday. On Sunday during the lunch break, we were blessed to have our new Chaplain, Tim Bergstrom, visit with the Outside Team regarding his ministry priorities at DCC.

DWCF FOUR-DAY WEEKEND

GOD'S LOVE

At the beginning of Kairos #24 at Denver Women's Correctional Facility (September 10 - 13, 2015), there were some obstacles and trials that gave our team of 23 the opportunity to show our Christian faith by relying on God for His will to be done in all circumstances. It was my great privilege and honor to be the Observing Leader learning all the ins and outs from our courageous Leader, Elizabeth Wilson. I wouldn't trade it for the world. Despite all the obstacles, I would have to say it turned out to be a very powerful and live-changing event for all present. Lives were being redeemed in one of the darkest places on earth - prison.

The team's encouragement and love for the participants is truly a living, breathing example of ordinary people representing God's love through our hands and feet. The 31 graduates admitted that when the weekend began Thursday night, they were feeling broken, lost, searching, scared, empty, hopeless, and without purpose.

The public of 110 people greeted the graduates at closing by signing "When the Saints Come Marching In." This welcomed and surprised participants, who were crying and smiling from ear to ear. The closing ceremony was moving, heartfelt, and uplifting. The participants willingly shared their new faith, hope, and love to a room of new family members.

One participant from the Family of Sarah said, "My daughter got cancer and I felt such a great burden of guilt because I wasn't there for her. I didn't feel whole. I forgave everyone but myself. After writing this guilt on water-soluble paper and watching it dissolve instantly in water, I found a different view and prospective. I cried, cried, and cried some more. My eyes were bloodshot and burned. I have forgiven myself for not being there. My daughter is now cancer free as of July and she has been taken care of by her grandparents, aunts, uncles, and, of course, God who took care of her knowing I couldn't."

Another participant said "coming to prison save my life." She also said, "I was addicted to drugs and Kairos has shown me how to **respond** to my choices."

Our 4th Day speaker encouraged all of the women participants by telling them just how special they are to God and how much he loves them. "You are God's favorite." she said. Then, she explained that we don't have to fight over who is God's favorite because God created the universe and if you just look around you and see the sunrise, mountains, or a baby born you will know God has enough Agape love for all of creation and he created you. She said also said, "The Kairos 4-Day is just a tiny fraction of God's love."

The weekend was about forgiveness: forgiving themselves and forgiving others, accepting God's love, and accepting the task of loving others and living out their new life. They were invited to the Instructional on Sept. 26th. The monthly Kairos reunions, along with Chaplin Tina's Wednesday Prayer and Share groups, will help them grow in their relationship with God and lean on each other for support. My prayer is for these women to stay strong on their journey. It won't be easy, but it isn't easy for any of us.

RIFLE TWO-DAY RETREAT

The Rifle Team presented a two day retreat, July 11 & 12, utilizing a slightly different approach. We used several short videos from Vantage, Volumes 1 & 2 from the Global Short Film Network. The videos were paired with lessons from the Serendipity Bible for Study Groups that dealt with related scriptures.

The Global Short Film Network assembles videos from a variety of sources that are designed to move the conversation to a spiritual level very quickly. The videos were basically a modern retelling of the Lost Coin, the Prodigal Son, the Good Samaritan, and one that dealt with inner freedom. We showed the videos to the assembled group and broke into smaller groups to discuss the videos and work through the related Serendipity lessons.

The videos were only six to eight minutes but they led to some deep discussions. The visual telling of the Bible stories seemed to help the men identify with the characters in these very familiar Bible stories.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE REPORT

I had the privilege of representing Colorado at the Kairos International Conference in Dallas Texas from July 30th - August 1st. Wayne Park, International Representative, and Randy Weldon, State Committee Chairman, also attended the conference. The theme of the conference was "Reflection of Jesus' light. We need to remember each of us represents this and that "a candle never losses nothing by lighting another candle."

God is doing amazing things with Kairos prison ministry and it's been a blessing to see this body of Kairos volunteers come together with such force. This conference allowed me to see the bigger picture and the consistency of Kairos throughout the world. The fellowship and opportunity to meet Kairos folks from all over the country and world was amazing. (Two folks in attendance were from South Africa). I've realized God's awe and might as He is using all Kairos volunteers to be his vessels and allow us to shine his light in a dark place.

In the mornings, we had worship services and the days were full of subcommittee meetings and workshops. The evenings were a time of fellowship with the entire group. On Friday night, we got to listen to Cleve Bell - the one remaining one of the "Nine Old Men" still alive - speak and hear firsthand of the history of Kairos.

A key topic this year was recruiting as there is a general feeling that Kairos will be growing in leaps and bounds in the next few years and we, as teams, need to be ready for this growth. Evelyn Lemly (KPMI Chief Executive Officer) told us that we have many prisons waiting for us to go into. She posed this question: "Do we realize we can double our volunteers and still not fill the opportunities we have today?"

Another hot topic was a new database which is called Kairos Messenger. We can expect this to be a reality within a few years. This tool will guide the ministry and be used to collect data as well as provide reports and information. It will pull in data from Ezra, Kairos Donor, and the Excellence Initiative. So, it is important that these databases have valid information entered into them. Version 7 of Ezra will have some changes in it that are needed to support Kairos Messenger.

We were given some stats about the ministry. I know we in Colorado don't do Kairos Outside or Torch, but many times at the conference it was mentioned that Kairos is comprised of these two ministries as well as Kairos Inside. Here are the stats:

- Kairos is in ten countries.
- In 2014 there were 360 men's Kairos Inside weekends, 66 women's Kairos Inside weekends, 30 Torch and 86 Kairos Outside weekends (which included 1 men's weekend).
- Overall there are 30,000 volunteers who reach 25,000 incarcerated people each year.

We should be as eager to discuss prison ministry. Does everyone in your church, your workplace, your family, your civic club, etc. know you are a Kairos volunteer?

KAIROS PRISON MINISTRY INTERNATIONAL

[Kairos Prison Ministry](#) is a lay-led Christian ministry which conducts a highly structured program designed for use in male and female correctional institutions. The Kairos program starts with a weekend event which allows participants to receive Christ's love through the servitude of Christian Kairos volunteers. During this event participants are given the opportunity to experience a spiritual renewal, accepting God's call to a life of Christian witness and service to one another during their stay in the institution, and beyond. Participants are encouraged to establish small, two-to-five-person "Fourth Day" Prayer and Share groups within the institution. The groups meet regularly to share their lives on a deep spiritual level and to pray for one another, other residents, and staff in the institution.

Kairos is currently in thirty-five states and nine other countries – Canada, United Kingdom, Australia, South Africa, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Honduras, Nicaragua, and Peru. The course materials are available in English and Spanish. The international ministry now includes some 30,000 volunteers.

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
